Stories from the President WHY I GO

Almost 68 years ago my Dad forced me into Sunday clothes and dragged me off kicking and screaming to the little Church on Huron Street. There poor, frazzled Mrs. Tsuji could only watch in despair as our little gang of *yancha bouzu* trampled her cramped house, which she tried so vainly to keep so tidy. My beloved Grand Lady still remembers those days,

thankfully fondly now. From there it was on to Bathurst Street where young adult members, gritting their teeth, dedicated all of their effort and time on Sunday mornings trying to tame us and instill in us the Teachings of the Buddha. Today I hope they believe that it was not in vain.

I wasn't sure what my Issei parents got out of the Church. I do recall that in the late 40s and the 50s Toronto Buddhist Church was one of the main sanctuaries for all of the Japanese Canadians, many of them freshly arrived from the West. Maybe it was as much a clubhouse or gathering place as it was a house of Buddhist prayer for the Issei and Nissei? My most vivid memories of kid-hood are not just of my Sunday School teachers struggling to control us, their frustration barely concealed. It was really the life-long bond created among all the kids from every part of the city - the Yoshidas, Matsuyamas, Nakamuras, Shimodas, Otanis, Hashimotos, Tsurudas, Kishidas, Amemoris. The list goes on and on. Going to the picnics on a big bus. The summer camps supervised by Rev. Tsuji and a crew of young men and women volunteers - the smell of fried cabbage is still in my nose. If not for the adults, the Church was a year-round club for the kids, for sure.

Growing up a bit, and being allowed by then by our parents to attend Church on Sundays without their dragging us there by our ears, most of us did everything possible to avoid services, getting back to Church from the restaurant barely in time to receive a "Thank you for coming" handshake from Rev. Ishiura. Then on to Junior YBA. In my wholly biased opinion it was the most successful social organization among the young Nisei and Sansei of the 60s. They included Club Recso, Japanese United Church Club, Japanese Anglican Church Club, and Nisei Students Club. Dances almost weekly in the darkened basement of the Church or at other club venues. So many opportunities to run into ripe young girls and awkward boys within the community. (But even then Nikkei girls were beginning to shun Nikkei boys and *vice versa.*) It's hard to get your head around this now, but the highlight of the social year in those days was the Miss Valentine Contest, a contest to pick the most, ahem, vivacious young Nikkei woman among all the community organizations. It was a time when the Japanese Canadian community was at its beautiful best, if "Japanese Canadian community" meant anything. But sadly, having a place to hang together and chasing girls and boys, none of that was enough to keep us at the Church. And so, without absorbing the real meaning or purpose of the Church which had allowed and encouraged all of us to be together, many of that generation drifted away from the Church and never returned.

I was one of those, though I returned once in a while over the following decades, only to disappear again and again. It was only a few years ago, a septuagenarian by then, that I felt obligated by circumstance to attend services regularly. I re-united with the mentors of my youth.

It took a while but it finally dawned on me what the real meaning of the Church was. All during my youth, I had treated the Church as a social club, a place to meet and greet my old Nikkei friends. When my friends drifted away, so did I. Career (try to exhaustion to be successful), family (make sure your kids are bragworthy), buy good stuff (European cars, Bloor Street), money (make sure you have a well-known financial planner), have

FUN (fun restaurants, fun vacations, fun cottages, fun clubs), keep up with the Tanakas, these were our preoccupations. I did not see or hear the sensei back then. I see and hear and feel it so much better now. I do still see remnants of the social clubs, which maybe partly explain all the social and non-religious activities that still occupy our Church building. This is all good.

I do realize now that the social stuff is not really why our pioneers built our new Temple (we call it a Temple now - another story) in 2005. The end game at our Temple really is learning and embracing how to live a Buddhist life. Our social life is necessary or desirable not just for the fellowship but more to enable us all to learn and contemplate and live together the Teaching of the Buddha in what is still our sanctuary. But today it is a different kind of sanctuary. We are seeing a new generation of members and friends from all walks of life who are embracing the Temple as their own. The new and the old are coming together in a sanctuary of peace and quiet, a place to listen and learn. A place to meditate and accept ourselves and each other no matter where we come from or what we look like or what language we speak. A place to respect ourselves and each other with our many imperfections and failings and show compassion (so long as our compassion is not abused (my training still reacts to this). A place to see the good that others do and not dwell too long on their failings; after all, who are we to criticize? I see this so much more clearly now, and for this I thank our Temple, Bishop Aoki, Reverend Yanko, our religious leaders, my old teachers, and all the members who have taught me by their example.

" IF "

There is a wonderful gift we possess that has the ability to both harm and, help others and oneself. This gift, is our ability to communicate, or more specificity our words.

Words are very powerful. They have the ability to both inspire, destroy, transform and influence. In saying that words have power, I curiously started pondering to myself; what could be considered to be one of the most powerful, or influential words if you will, that is most commonly used every day? I think it is the word, if.

I think it is interesting, that with the thousands of words we have at our disposal to use in the English language, 'if' seems to be one of the most utilized in both thought and speech. Usually when we use the word 'if', it is in some scenario of a regret or desire. 'If I had only done that differently' or 'If this, or, that were to happen'.

The 'if, in my mind, is what Shinran Shonin was referring to when he used the term "Calculating mind", in Japanese it is called "Hakarai". Hakarai is to deliberate, analyze and take a course of action. Hakarai, can, be the action of self-power (Jiriki). So when we use the word 'if' it is usually directed towards and through the action (Hakarai) of Self power (Jiriki) to be used towards our own calculations (desires).

When our self-desires are directed towards ourselves, we may think such things as "if this were to happen, or, if I were to get that thing I want, then I would be happy". When our self-desires are directed towards others, we may think such things as "if they would only make this choice or act a certain way, then I would be happy".

Desire leads to attachment. Attachment is one of the sufferings the Buddha has taught us we must condition our minds to resist in order to alleviate suffering. Therefore, to rely on our own self calculations / the mind of self-power (Kiriki) to lead oneself to the cessation of suffering and enlightenment, is a futile act that will only lead

constant suffering and rebirth. It may be, that we sometimes see ourselves as needing to be good enough, or at a certain ' place ' in our lives in order to be ' worthy ' of the salvation of Amida Buddha, or to receive enlightenment. It's in our human nature we always want to put forward, what we see as, our best self. However, this futile exercise is not necessary when we look at the Eighteenth Vow. Dharmakara's vow to save all sentient beings before attaining his own Buddhahood, and the fact that he became Amida Buddha through the fulfilment of the Primal Vow, is the assurance of our place in the Pure Land.

"If, when I attain Buddhahood, sentient beings in the lands of the ten quarters who sincerely and joyfully entrust themselves to me, desire to be born in my land, and call my Name, even ten times, should not be born there, may I not attain perfect Enlightenment" - Primal Vow

The assurance of our place in the Pure Land, guaranteed by the fulfilment of Dharmakarma's vow gives us the freedom from the mind of calculation, or the mind of 'if'. Dharmakara's liberating, fulfilled vow, is the action (Hakarai) of Amida which transcends self (Jiriki) and other power (Tariki)

Shinran Shonin knew that for him, the calculating mind was not possible to be rid of. At the same time, he also accepted that his calculating thinking, and the workings of Amida Buddha, where mutually exclusive.

"No working (practitioner hakarai) is true working (Amida's hakarai)." - Shinran Shonin.

As with Shinran Shonin, we as foolish beings may never be able to free ourselves of our calculating mind. The word 'if' will always be in the forefront of our mind. However, this does not mean that we should not strive for enlightenment. It is this striving and the workings of and through, that are the vessel of the workings (Hakarai) of Amida Buddha. This is what Shinran is referring to when he states that the practitioners and Amida Buddha's workings (Hakarai) are of the same.

"I have read your letter very carefully.

I fail to understand why your question should arise, for although we speak of Vow and of Name, these are not two different things. There is no Name separate from the Vow; there is no Vow separate from the Name. Even to say this, however, is to impose one's own calculation. Once you simply realize that the Vow surpasses conceptual understanding and with singleness of heart realize that the Name surpasses conceptual understanding and pronounce it, why should you labour in your own calculation?

It seems to me that with all your attempts to understand by reasoning and by learning you have fallen into confusion. It is completely in error. Once you have simply come to realize that Vow and Name surpass conceptual understanding, you should not calculate in this way or that. There must be nothing of your calculation in the act that leads to birth.

Respectfully, you must entrust yourself to Tathagata. (Amida Buddha)

Respectfully.

Meditation and Mindfulness



ESHINNI'S LETTERS

In 1920, Prof. Washio Kyodo discovered in the archives of Nishi Honganji 10 letters by Eshinni., Shinran Shonin's wife to their youngest daughter, Kakushinni. These are very important in filling in the blanks of the Mt. Hiei years and Shinran's stay in Sanuki.

One of the letters told of the 20 years of Shinran Shonin as a Tendai monk on Mt. Hiel and his departure in a search for a more meaningful path to enlightenment. Another letter describes Shinran Shonin's lapse in his devotion to the other power. His attempt to recite the 3 Pure Land Sutra a thousand times was abandoned after only 3 or 4 days. He once again embraced other power of Amida Buddha and his Vow of Compassion. This lapse shows the Shinran's human side and the doubt reflects the process of awakening.

Kids Sangha meets every 1st and 3rd Sundays of the month.


The program is open to all families so please feel free to drop in anytime.

MEMBERSHIP VOW

As a member of the Toronto Buddhist Church, I:

- Recognize and accept that our Temple is based on the Jodo Shinshu Pure Land Teachings
- Vow to strive to live a life of gratitude and to do my best to care for the welfare of society: and
- Vow to observe and uphold the Charter and By-laws of the Temple.

Dear Temple Members and Prospective Members:

The Temple's membership program has been in effect for five years now. However, from time to time even now, some of our congregation are still asking questions about the membership rules and why we made the change that we implemented five years ago.

Before the Temple implemented the new rules, the definition of "member" was far from clear. Some relied on "pledge membership". Others assumed that membership in one or more of the Temple service groups such as Sangha, Dana or Shin Fujinkai automatically meant membership in the Temple. Still others believed that any "konshi" donation entitled them to membership. No one was told that he or she was not a member. This led to confusion about who was entitled to vote on important matters at meetings of members, such as the Annual General meeting. In addition, the question of membership was always important to the Temple because it paid a hefty assessment each year to Jodo Shinshu Buddhist Temples of Canada based on its membership.

But since then new provincial laws have been passed and will soon come into force. These new laws will govern how a not-for-profit organization like the Temple must be structured and managed. Included in these new laws is a requirement that the Temple must carefully define who its members are and specify the conditions of membership. Even without the new laws, this is important because members have rights which can affect the ownership and management of the Temple. It was in anticipation of these new laws that we established formal rules of membership for our Temple.

The following is a summary of the membership rules for the Temple.

For someone to be a **regular** member, he or she must submit annually a signed membership application which will be presented to the Board, and pay an annual membership fee by May 31. A membership card will be issued annually to each member in good standing.

An **honorary** member is an individual who has reached the age of 77 years, and has submitted a membership application. The membership application will be presented to the Board for approval. No annual membership fee is required although donations are gratefully accepted. Once an original membership application has been filed, the member will be a member for life, but the Temple is asking for annual written confirmation that he or she wishes to continue to be a member. New Honorary members will be issued a special lifetime membership card.

We hope this explanation helps you understand what membership means and why we established these simple rules. If you have any questions or doubts please do not hesitate to contact Roy Kusano, President; Darlene Rieger or Diane Mark.
