## With Gratitude

On Wednesday, May 27, I had the privilege of participating in the Sarana Affirmation ceremony at the Temple. It was led by Gomonshu-sama – Nishi Hongwanji's head priest.

Prior to the Gomonshu's visit, I had some questions, such as, "Who is this person? What does he look like - is he young, old or maybe somewhere in the middle?" I wondered what would he be wearing – would he be wearing regular street clothes or Buddhist robes? Another question I had was, "Can I high five him when meeting him?" What was considered proper etiquette when meeting the Gomonshu?

I Googled to find out as much as I could about him, but I found that the information was limited, so I decided I would just have to go with the flow.

On the day of his arrival, a group of Temple members gathered at Pearson Airport to welcome him. After waiting for some time, the moment we had all been waiting for arrived, and a young man in a regular black suit emerged through the arrival doors. My first thought was, "Oh, he kind of looks like a skinnier version of my brother. Then again, he also looks like my dentist, Dr. Azuma."

As we formed a semi-circle around Gomonshu-sama, Bishop Aoki graciously introduced each one of us to him. And although there was no formal hand shake, I just knew that it was a honour to be in Gomonshu-sama's presence. Welcoming him at the airport, although brief, was well worth the wait.

The Sarana Affirmation ceremony took place at the Temple. Prior to the appearance of the Gomonshu in the hondo, we were quickly briefed on the procedures and protocol that were part of the affirmation service. I was suddenly nervous because I began thinking about when to bow and when not to bow – I wanted to get it right. The affirmation ceremony went smoothly and as we Canadians say, "without a hitch". Gomonshu-sama had a calming presence that made me feel calm and peaceful throughout the entire ceremony.

On that special day, I left the temple with a new Buddhist name and an incredible feeling of gratitude and pure joy. Being given the opportunity to participate in the affirmation ceremony instilled in me a sense of gratitude. I found myself reflecting and thinking about my dad, and I again felt blessed that he had raised us as Buddhists and instilled in us at an early age the wish to follow the teachings of the Nembutsu.

Thus, affirming my faith was very meaningful to me.

For example, volunteer cooks (Joanne Kataoka, Grace Taguchi, Ray Nakano, Dave Saxby) every year cook meals for the counsellors and campers three times a day and the counsellors are able to provide campers with a safe environment to have fun and learn various Buddhist teachings. Despite being split into three competing groups, the campers help each other with daily chores and demonstrate empathy when others are feeling down.

As for the superhero theme, teams competed against each other and created their own crime fighting teams and developed cheers, posters, sand castles and skits with both themes in mind. Each group produced creative results and two groups even worked together and performed in each other's skits.

This year, everybody welcomed Rev. Endo to Camp Lumbini for the first time. Rev. Endo arrived on Sunday and participated in daily activities with campers and delivered a Dharma talk about the importance of caring for our loved ones. In another Buddhism 101 session, Rev. ## Camp Lumbini Looking to Chill

Camp Lumbini is a recreational property in popular Wasaga Beach, Ontario. It has been owned by Toronto Buddhist Church for decades. Camp Lumbini is not available for public rental. It has been used as a camp facility for the Youth and Young Adults as well as the young children of the Temple. In addition, during the summer months of July and August, it has been offered for a very reasonable nightly fee and weekly rental of the cabins on the property to Temple members and their families. A more formal rental program is currently being developed for Temple families and hopefully will be in place for the next rental season in 2016.

There are three cabins at the camp. The cabins are, candidly, rustic, but each cabin is fully furnished with hydro, running water, toilet, shower and kitchen. The property is especially suited for families with young children. The lot outside the back door of each cabin is filled with sand. And within a five minute walk away lies a wonderful, endless, quiet beach with shallow water ideal for kids.

Most if not all of the furnishings and appliances have been donated by Temple members over the years. **At this time, one of the cabins is in dire need of a used refrigerator/freezer in good working condition, so if any of our readers have one that he or she would be willing to donate, please contact the Temple office, and the Temple will gratefully arrange to pick it up.**

Camp Lumbini closes for the season at the end of August and will re-open in July 2016. Temple members may make inquiries at the Temple office about rentals starting in the Spring.

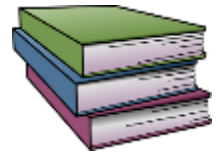

## Following the Footsteps of the Buddha

With the approval of the JSBTC, Roy and Itoko Akune have organized a tour to India “following the footsteps of the Buddha”. This 14 day tour includes visits to the major Buddhist sites of Bodhgaya, Rajgir, Nalanda, Kushinagar, Lumbini and Sarnath and other key sites such as the Taj Mahal, Ganges River, Varanasi and Jaipur.

*The tour begins February 1, 2016, in Delhi and returns February 14 to Delhi. The cost is \$1075 US /person/double occupancy with a single supplement of \$765 US.*

*This does include 3 star hotel accommodations, three meals/day, Welcome Dinner prior to departure, AC deluxe coach for all transfers and tours, entrance fees, elephant/jeep ride in Jaipur ascending Amer Fort, a boat ride on the Ganges River, airfare for domestic flights, accompanying tour guide, and applicable taxes.*

*This does not include international air fare from a city in Canada or other country, Nepal Visa fee (presently \$25 US/person), tips (hotels, guide, driver & helper) and other unstated personal expenses, e.g. phone calls, laundry, drinks etc.*

Indeed, for some this will be a once in a lifetime visit to India and for others it may be another visit where the sights, sounds and customs have captured one's interest. For Roy and Itoko this will be their third visit to India having been there in 2002 and, as recently as, October, 2014.

This tour will be accompanied by an English speaking guide, knowledgeable about the history of Buddhism and, of course, very familiar with the Indian culture.

**This tour has a maximum capacity of 24. Those interested are encouraged to apply ASAP with applications to close November 30, 2015. Application form is attached to this notice.**
